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From the Pastor's Desk

My dear parish family:

All too often we hear a reading at Mass and we think, “Oh, I’ve heard this before.” Yes, our eyes glazed over, our minds turn to planning the rest of Saturday evening or Sunday afternoon. The Beatitudes are a prime example for the familiar “spiritual haze.” What we often need to literally jolt us into a better spiritual mindset, is a shock to our system to bring us to a deeper realization of Jesus Christ’s presence into our lives; and furthermore, how we can bear Him witness in the world, that is constantly blind, deaf, and mute towards Him, in fact, most of the sacred.

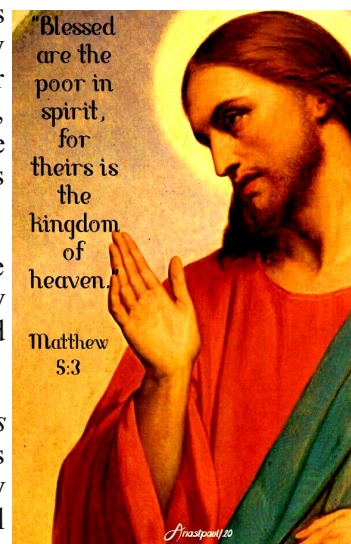
The Beatitudes are the focus of the Gospel narrative this weekend, and the first, “*blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven,*” is used by Jesus to describe not only Himself, but all of us – His disciples, witnesses and friends. That word is “poor” or even more shocking let’s say, “nothingness!”

When Jesus begins the Beatitudes with “*blessed are the poor in spirit; theirs is the kingdom of heaven*” He is reminding the hundreds gathered there on the grass for His Sermon on the Mount, and us gathered in pews here, that nothingness is key to living what He preaches. Clarifying some of the words on an etymological (history of language) level of the first beatitude might help our meditation. First, the word “blessed” is *makarios* in the original Greek of the Gospel of Matthew. It means “happy!” The word translated centuries ago into Latin first and then to other languages, as poor is *ptoches* in Greek. It means not simply poor, but absolute destitution. These are the people who own nothing and whom the First Century world considered to be worthless. Jesus, the Good Shepherd – the Lord of All Time and History – declares these people to be happy! Huh? Quite the shock, right? They are happy because they have the Kingdom of Heaven, that is, oneness or union or communion with God.

Yes, Jesus is saying the “poor in spirit” are symbolic of the most necessary spiritual practice: interior nothingness. Happiness is the state of interior nothingness. Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Happy are those who are in the state of interior nothingness for theirs is the realization of being totally together with God – though God – and in God. The poor in spirit are happy with the invisible God and have let go all other sources of happiness. They are nothing within because they release all thinking while with pure faith, bare hope, and naked love. They drop all thinking – everything within – and fall into God Himself. Talk about a shocking revelation! Talk about a call by God in His human form to all of us to sacrifice. Yes, sacrifice,, like Him!

How can we live this first beatitude? First is to sink – to drop – to totally fall into the nothingness in prayer. God is not a thing to have or to hold or to hoard, like so many people do with “stuff”, but He is a mystery beyond being. Therefore, we can pray by sinking into the nothingness of God. We close our eyes and let everything in our minds fall away. We relax into the inner nothingness. Sinking into nothingness is to find all our happiness in God, the infinite nothing else, but pure divine wonder. It is to rest in God within and not pay attention to anything – a freely willed detachment from everything we think gives us happiness, allowing God to fill us with His grace. Don’t resist. When we become “poor in spirit,” as the Beatitudes teach us, we get moments of happiness straight from God that we never want to stop. By accepting this wonder of God entering the emptiness we have prepared for Him without fighting it, holding on to it, or judging it, is to accept God as Mystery in the poverty of a little moment.

In the Beatitudes and the rest of the Sermon on the Mount, showing mercy, being meek, thirsting for justice all depend on emptying out our interior self, the fertile ground for God’s own life to express itself through us. The poor in spirit have hearts free and ready for God’s presence and love. The poor in spirit can love their enemies and not worry. They can be humble, honest, and compassionate. They can let go of the anger that gives rise to violence, quarreling, and even murder. Their hearts are wide open to God’s mercy. In such a heart, there is no selfishness. In such a heart, there is nothing but God! Therefore, if we prepare our hearts like this today and always, then the Lord’s final word’s this weekend will be so much more beautiful: “*Rejoice and be glad! For your reward will be great in heaven!*” Amen to that!
