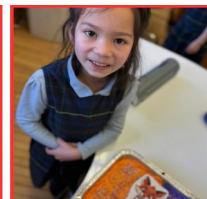
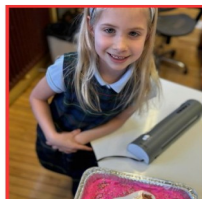

From the Pastor's Desk

THE PHANTOMS OF THE PASSION – THE SEQUEL

2026 Lenten Meditation Series + Part I – MALCHUS: Healed by God

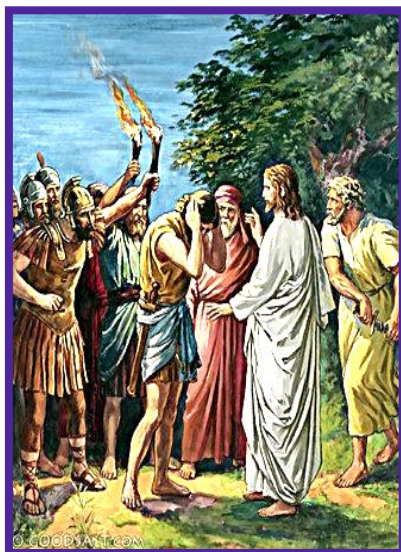
My dear parish family:

Two years ago, I offered a weekly Lenten mediation on five so-called “phantoms of the Passion” – persons in the Gospel’s narrative around the Lord’s Passion, Death, and Resurrection, who appear quickly in the biblical text, and then disappear just as fast. This Lent we meet five new “phantoms.” Each week I will reflect on them here in the bulletin and then offer an additional reflection from the pulpit during the weekend masses in the homily. Without any further ado, let’s begin with the man with the temporarily severed ear – Malchus.

All four Gospels tell of how the High Priest’s servant got his ear cut off when Jesus was arrested. Matthew, Mark, and Luke don’t mention his name, and this makes sense because Peter would have been in significantly more trouble if they had openly named the wounded servant. The Evangelist John (who always narrates quite differently) however names both Peter and the servant, Malchus. Many scholars believe that John was a distant relative of Caiaphas and Annas, so he was probably in the know as to the names, but there is something about the deliberate way John says, “*The servant’s name was Malchus.*” John understood the Jewish view of the power of names. Malchus means “counselor or king.” That’s very ironic when we think about it. While John is the only one of the writers to call Malchus by name (and name Peter as the one who wields the sword), Luke, who is commonly known as what we would call a physician today, is the only evangelist to record that Jesus *healed* the wounded ear.

Outside of the Gospels we never hear of Malchus again! There doesn’t appear to be a “Saint Malchus” and yet he seems like someone who would have become Christian later – maybe encountering the Risen Jesus. Malchus has heard both sides of the story. On the one side is the High Priest and the Temple who having waited all this time for a Messiah, don’t want Jesus. On the other side, if the Gospel message Jesus brings is true, Malchus is given the opportunity to choose the *true* High Priest – Jesus, not Caiaphas.

When the soldiers arrive with Judas prepared to make an arrest, Jesus asks them who they are looking for. “*Jesus the Nazarene,*” they say and He says, “*I AM.*” At this point John tells us they stepped back and fell to the ground, because Jesus uttered the divine name, “*I AM.*” Therefore, Malchus ends up on the ground because of the Name of God. After this Malchus gets his ear cut off and Jesus heals it back. None of this makes any difference in the end, and Jesus is still arrested and then hauled off to the High Priest to stand idly by in a “kangaroo court.” Jesus is then crucified and there is the Sabbath when all falls silent. The Apostles went back to the Upper room to cower in fear. Not one of them went off with the women on Sunday morning to see if Jesus – their friend, teacher, and Lord had risen. They didn’t *seem* to believe He would.



So, what happens to Malchus? Who does he listen to once that ear is healed? We are not told. There are no legends from long ago that tell us Malchus was baptized. Was he at the foot of the Cross making sure the deed was done? Did he see the darkened sky, and feel the earthquake? Surely, he saw the curtain in the sanctuary torn ripping it from top to bottom being a close servant to the High Priest. But none of this appears in the scriptural accounts. It seems that despite hearing what Jesus had to say, despite seeing up close and personal, the spite and fear (I would say bullying) of Caiaphas; despite the miracles he witnessed and even received, Malchus never believed. Is this all there is about the man healed by Jesus? The homily this weekend will hopefully help us reflect more on the enigmatic person from the Garden of Gethsemane – and simultaneously help us as we begin our Lenten journey.

May our desert journey this Lent prepare us for the countless joys of Easter!
